## **FLAG CEREMONY**

## April 20, 2013 Hilton Garden Inn, Springfield

Good morning, and welcome to the 67<sup>th</sup> Oregon State Convention! Judy's theme this year has been "Heart and Hands Celebrate ESA", and that is what is planned for this weekend - to celebrate our sisterhood, to celebrate all the work we do for St. Jude, Easter Seal and our local communities and the fun we have doing it, and, most importantly, to celebrate the love and caring we share with each other.

I am so excited and proud to be standing before you today since this is the first flag ceremony I've been able to conduct since becoming a citizen of this great country a year and a half ago. Thank you, Judy, for allowing me this honor. When we hear the words "Oh beautiful, for spacious skies, for amber waves of grain, for purple mountain majesty above the fruited plains, America, America, God grant thy grace on thee, and crown thy good with brotherhood from sea to shining sea", we can't help but visualize the glory of this great nation that we call home. We are thankful for the men and women of our armed forces that fight to protect our freedom, and we are grateful for all those that rally to the needs of their fellowman when disaster strikes. This has never been more evident than during the travesty that occurred in Boston this past Monday, when bystanders rushed to aid those injured in the blast, when participants in the race continued running to nearby hospitals to donate blood, when Americans all across the country responded as one to the call for prayer and compassion and assistance. This is our country at its best. This is America!

For more than 200 years, the American flag has been the symbol of our nation's strength and unity and a source of pride and inspiration for millions of citizens. Born in Philadelphia on June 14, 1777, our flag symbolizes the patriotic ideals of a nation 'conceived in liberty'. Originally, the flag had thirteen stripes, alternating seven red and six white, and thirteen white stars in a blue field, representing the first thirteen states. Today, the flag still has the same thirteen horizontal stripes, representing the original 13 colonies, but there are now fifty stars, representing the 50 states. The red of the flag symbolizes Hardiness and Valor, the white is for Purity and Innocence and the blue represents Vigilance, Perseverance and Justice.

We are honored today to have Susan Winters, our International Council President, with us as our IC Representative. Please rise as she presents our nation's flag, then remain standing for the Pledge of Allegiance.

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all".

You may be seated.

The Oregon State Flag is carried by our Oregon State Council President, Judy Johnson, a member of Zeta Zeta, Bend. The brilliant blue and gold of the flag encompasses and protects all the people of our great state, from coastal shores to mountain peaks, from high deserts to lush valleys.

The All Faiths flag is presented by Debbie Sanguras, the Oregon State Chaplain and a member of Delta Kappa, Hood River. The flag is symbolic of all our faiths, regardless of denomination or creed. The green represents the spiritual growth in our lives, with a circle of never-ending friendships. The white dove depicts love and peace among all mankind.

The ESA Banner is carried today by Kathy State, Chairman of the Gavels and a member of Delta Xi, Portland. This blue and gold flag symbolizes the golden Lamp of Learning and the Open Book unfolding a wealth of knowledge. It pays tribute to sisters joining in the ideals and standards of ESA and is the heritage of us all.

**The ESA Foundation flag**, carried by Lynn Hughes, Advisor and Past Foundation Chair and a member of Gamma Beta, Grants Pass, is blue and white with a globe depicting the motto "Serving The World Community Because We Care".

Carrying the St. Jude's flag is Darlene Hoffman, the Senior Circle of Life Chair and a member of Alpha Omicron, Madras. The St. Jude Children's Research Hospital mission is to find cures for children's catastrophic illnesses through research and treatment. The dedication and tireless efforts of all our ESA sisters have truly become a cause to celebrate in helping to fulfill the hospital's mission and aiding in realizing a dream come true.

The Easter Seal flag is carried by Melanie Swann, Junior Easter Seal Chair and member of Beta Omicron, Burns. This flag symbolizes the mission of Easter Seals which is to create solutions and change lives by helping disabled people gain greater independence. Each year, Easter Seals helps more than one million children and adults with medical rehabilitation, occupational and physical therapy as well as speech and hearing therapy, job training for employment and child care. Oregon's dedication to the mission of Easter Seals has been ongoing for many years and ESA members are very proud of their involvement.

Next, we have **the Western States Regional Council flag** carried by Donna Cassidy, the Western States Parliamentarian and a member of Delta Xi, Portland. The flag is a symbol of unity between Alaska, Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona and Australia. Together, we share the goals, ideals and enthusiasm of ESA.

We continue now with the flags of our district councils. The first flag is that of our State President's district, **the Central District Council**, carried by their President, Louise Muir of Alpha Omicron, Madras. The blue, with a darker blue circle, encompasses symbols depicting the many majestic mountains and the beautiful high desert plateaus of the region.

The flag of our host district, the Willamette Valley District Council, carried by District President Julie Rassmann of Delta Gamma, is white and has a seascape within a circle and a lone tree, symbolizing the area from the mountains to the sea.

The Eastern District flag, carried by the District President Amber Heine of Delta Epsilon, LaGrande, has a brown background with symbols depicting the diversity of the area, from the majestic Wallowa Mountains to the fields of grain and the pioneer spirit of the people. The cowboy depicts the famous Pendleton Roundup.

The Southern District Council flag, carried by Ellen Ellis of Gamma Beta, Grants Pass, has a circle of green within which are symbols of the rivers, mountains and industries of the region.

The Coast District flag, carried by the District President Thelma Burch of Alpha Psi, Port Orford, portrays the ever-moving ocean, clouds, sunsets and

soaring seagulls, indicative of the beauty of the Oregon Coast.

The Douglas District flag, carried by District President Judith Huntley of Beta Eta, Sutherlin, is in the shape of Douglas County. On one side is a Douglas fir; on the other side is a circle, within which are symbols showing the various economic and recreational aspects of the county.

The Northwest District flag is carried by District President Donna Bush of Omicron Omega, Portland. The field of blue represents the beauty of the Cascades and the mighty Columbia River. The Capital Building depicts the political strength of the region and the apple is the symbol of the great agricultural production in the area.

Members of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, these are the flags that symbolize all that we hold dear. I ask you to please take the time to remember their meanings as we celebrate our time together at this convention.
