





For our combined March Educational/Social, we are getting together to make Blessing Bags for the homeless, and Fidget Blankets for Alzheimer/Dementia/Autism patients.

Most of you probably know what Blessing Bags are: Large Zip Lock bags filled with personal necessities, such as water, soap, deodorant and other personal hygiene items, hand sanitizers, hand warmers, non perishable food items, some money(quarters), etc. These bags can be given to any homeless person you see. We have a local park where many homeless congregate, so will probably bring our bags there.

Fidget Blankets (or Quilts) are small quilts that have different textures and items attached to enhance sensory stimulation. They help keep patients focused on an activity which can help reduce boredom and emotional agitation. Because of this, it helps to relieve caregivers since the patient is absorbed in the activity.

Different textures such as fur, suede, lace, or burlap can be used. Also items such as ribbon, zippers, keys, buttons, buckles, stuffed toys, pockets, and beads are used to keep hands active. Just get onto Pinterest and search for "Fidget Blanket" and you will be amazed at the number of examples and patterns available!

Our group is actually making "The Busy Hands Fidget Apron" (free pattern on Pinterest). For a start, we are making one for a woman, and one for a man. We will donate these to one of our local memory care facilities. We will share pictures of our completed aprons for the next issue of Grapevine!

After having this much fun, we will also probably do lunch!


