Good Morning!

Welcome to the 73rd Oregon State convention.

Our Oregon State Council President theme this year has been "Happiness is ESA". It makes me happy to see each and everyone of you here today.

We start this morning's ceremony flag ceremony with the **United States of America Flag**. Today our flag consist of 13 horizontal stripes - seven red alternating with six white. The stripes representing the original 13 colonies, and the stars representing the 50 states of the union. The colors of the flag are symbolic as well - red symbolizes hardiness in valor, white symbolizes purity and innocence, and blue represents vigilance, perseverance, and justice.

We are honored today to have Robin Bussey, our International Council Treasurer with us as our IC Representative. Please rise as she presents our nation's flag, then remain standing for the Pledge of Allegiance.

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

The Oregon State Flag is presented by Nancy Reid our Oregon State President. Adopted in 1925, the flag is colored navy blue with gold lettering and symbols. The flag front the words "State of Oregon" are displayed above a gold shield surrounded by 33 stars. The stars represent Oregon as the 33rd state to be admitted to the union. The shield which is part of the state seal depicts the many great opportunities and experiences that are quintessentially Oregon. Below this is the year 1859 when Oregon was admitted to the union. Being known as "The Beaver State" it should come as no surprise there is USA beaver on the back. The Oregon State flag is the only state to carry a different design on each side.

The Washington State Flag is presented by Theresa Duhamel, Washington State President. The Washington state flag is the only state flag with a green field and it's the only state flag that displays an image of an actual person. It is a fitting representation of the Evergreen State, and the only state to be named in honor of a United States President.

The ESA Foundation Flag is presented by Claudia Hale, Oregon State Foundation Counselor. Dedicated to making a difference in the world community, the ESA flag is illustrated with a globe depicting the motto "Serving The World Community Because We Care".

The St. Jude Flag is presented by Sandra Bristow, Senior Circle of Life Chair. The St. Jude Children's Research Hospital mission is to find cures for children with catastrophic illnesses through research and treatment. The dedication and tireless efforts of our ESA members have truly become a cause to celebrate in helping to fulfill the hospital's mission and aiding in realizing a dream come true.

The Western States Regional Council Flag is presented by Judy Huntley, Oregon's Western States Representative. The flag is a symbol of unity between Alaska, Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona and Australia. Together, we share the goals, ideals and enthusiam of ESA.

We continue now with the flags of our district councils. First is the flag of our State President's council, **the Central District Council Flag** is presented by their district president, Barb Moss. The blue flag, with a darker blue circle, encompasses symbols depicting the many majestic mountains and the beautiful high desert plateaus of the region.

Next is the flag of our host district, **the Willamette Valley District Council Flag** is presented by their district president, Su McDonell. The flag is white and has a seascape within a circle and a lone tree, symbolizing the area from the mountains to the sea.

The Douglas District Council Flag is presented by their district president, Vicki Boler. On one side is a Douglas fir. On the other side is a circle, within which are symbols showing the various economic and recreational aspects of the county.

The Eastern District Council Flag, presented by their district president, Kathy Rudd. The flag has a brown background with symbols depicting the diversity of the area, from the majestic Wallowa Mountains to the fields of grain and the pioneer spirit of the people. The cowboy represents the famous Pendleton Roundup.

The Northwest District Council Flag presented by their district president, Karen McNeil. The field of blue represents the beauty of the Cascades and the mighty Columbia River. The capital building depicts the political strength of the region and the apple is the symbol of the great agricultural production in the area.

The Southern District Council Flag presented by their district president, Shirley Reese. The flag has a circle of green within which are symbols of the rivers, mountains and industries of the region.

Members of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, these are the flags that sybolize all that we hold dear. I ask you to please take the time to remember their meanings as we celebrate our time together at this convention.

Presenting the POW-MIA Remembrance Ceremony for us this morning is Mr. Virgil "Bud" Dickey, Oregon Army National Guard Captain, Retired.

Bud served as an enlisted soldier, then as an officer in the Field Artillery, and in the Infantry from 1982 – 2006. While in the Army National Guard, Bud held many positions including Mortar Platoon Leader, Company Executive Officer, Company Commander, Battalion Logistics Officer S4, Battalion Intelligence Officer S2, 2- 162 IN Rear Detachment Operation Iraqi Freedom Liaison, Oregon National Guard Mobilization/Demobilization Liaison, Deployed Regional Family Assistance Centers Liaison, Community Family Support Programs, Madigan Army Hospital, Army Mobilization Stations, and Dept. of Veterans Affairs Point of Contact and Liaison.

Bud still continues to serve his military brothers and sisters as he is the Vocational Rehabilitation Coordinator at the Roseburg VA Health Care System, assisting Veterans with employment and transitional work therapy and training, helping them to transition from active duty, guard and reserve status to a productive civilian life.

Red ribbon tied so prominently on the base is reminiscent of the red ribbon worm upon the lapel and breast of the thousands who bear witness to their unyielding determination to demand a proper accounting of our missing.

A slice of lemon is on the plate to remind us of their bitter fate.

There is salt upon the bread plate - symbolic of the families tears as they wait.

The glass is inverted as they cannot tell us with us this evening.

The chair is empty as they are not here.

Remember all of you who served with them and call them comrades, who depended on their might and relied on them, for surely they have not forgotten you.
